

Suggestions from overall comments:



Thank you to everyone for your contributions to support the work of SC WELCA and our churchwide organization. Your financial support year to date includes \$11,756 in Regular Offerings, (of which 65% or \$7,641, have been sent to Churchwide), \$5,672 in Joy Offerings for ELCA Good Gifts, \$5,098 in convention offerings and over \$18,000 to support our convention projects (see Mission Action Report for details on our convention projects).

At the SC WELCA Convention we received the Financial Report and Audit Report for the 2017-2018 fiscal year and voted to adopt the proposed budget of \$67,300 for fiscal year February 2019 to January 2020. All of these documents were included in the Bulletin of Reports provided to all voting members at the Convention.

In the next couple of weeks each congregational unit treasurer will receive a Receipt of Offerings submitted as of June 30th and each conference financial secretary will receive a Financial Statement as of June 30th. Please review these statements and let me know if you have any questions.
















2018 Convention Projects

Thank you for the difference you make in the lives of our local (Lutheran Services Carolinas "Love One Another" Campaign) and global (Girls' Dormitories in Tanzania) recipients. The convention projects were a huge success. We raised cash, checks and gift cards totaling \$11,617.51 and collected 9,265 in donated items for LSC. We raised \$11,867.51 in cash and checks, \$3,440.00 in silent auction for a total of \$15,307.51. What an impact and showing of generosity and love for one another as sisters in Christ.

The chart below shows the local project number of in-kind gifts as well as monetary contributions of gifts cards, checks, and cash. We supported the Lutheran Services Carolinas, "Love One Another" Campaign, which helped three different projects: Welcoming A Stranger, Guiding Young People Transitioning Out Of Foster Care, and Encouraging Individuals With Development Disabilities. We were so excited to help Lutheran Services Carolinas kick off their Campaign.

The chart below also shows the global project of helping the Girls' Dormitories in Tanzania. We received monetary gifts along with donated items for the silent auction and raised money to help toward our goal of \$10,000. This will be a great help for the girls in supplying new dormitory furnishing to make the girls feel at home.

Again, we greatly appreciate your service, generous gifts, your support and prayers as we showed God's Light in response to Jesus' commandment to Love One Another.

Convention Workshop Highlights

Thrivent "Making a Difference" Workshop

Micah Velilla, a Thrivent representative, led a session on Generous Living. A booklet titled "Making a Difference Sharing Your Time, Talents and Treasures" was distributed. The booklet is a workbook to define what your generosity plan can be and how it can grow.

The session opened with prayer. Micah continued by teaching the group that generous living was based on the Matthew parable of the mustard seed illustrating how the smallest seed can grow into one of the largest bushes in the garden. The underlying theme is to take what God has given you and growing it. It is suggested that we inventory our values because values are our motivators. These values are to be associated with Christian principles. In Acts there are passages about selling our possessions and giving the proceeds to those in need. Through all this evaluating and planning we are to remember that Jesus said to us in Luke 12:22-31 – Not to worry. God will take care of you. God is pleased to give you the Kingdom.

God wants us to live a more abundant life out of intentional sharing of our gifts.

Sharing the Light with Pastor Eric Wolf

Pastor Eric used a handout Bible Study titled, <u>Being Church Together in a Modern Age</u>, to lead his presentation. It used the story of David and Bathsheba from the Old Testament to incorporate our current atmosphere of the "Me Too" movement. Each group would have had some differences in discussion, but in general he summarized the discussion with <u>ways we can create a safe culture in our congregations</u>.

We have the responsibility to believe people who bring a complaint.

Church councils should have a plan in place to handle this if situations should arise.

The synod office is always available for congregational support.

We still love the person who commits a breach.

Convention Workshop Highlights (cont'd)

In the Potter's Hand with Roger Clark

Attendees were kept mesmerized by the spinning potter's wheel as Baptist Pastor Roger Clark formed a beautiful vase while connecting the group to our relationship with our Creator. His two passions are clay and teaching the Word. He explained how centering the clay on the wheel is actually a difficult task to learn and how many would-be potters give up pottery because of it. He related that to our ability to follow the will of God. He goes on during the molding of the pot to discuss what the presence of God is like and how we should try to see people as He sees them. We work on this through our confession, devotional life and practicing our awareness of Him. By the end of the session he had a large vase ready to be fired.

Bridging the Gap with Kristin Snelgrove

Bridging the Gap was a workshop focused not only on encouraging young women to join WELCA but also on uniting generations of women. Using the verse from 1 Thessalonians 5:11, "Therefore, encourage one another and build each other up," Kristin asked three questions; Why? What? and How? Why are younger women saying no to WELCA groups when many were active in youth groups? What would it take for younger women to feel included? And finally, how can meetings be held so that a younger generation feels included and connected? The answers to theses questions varied from person to person but most responses included just knowing the person you want to invite. If there are ladies who want to meet for WELCA but cannot attend meetings during the week, try hosting events on the weekends or during Sunday school. Another idea is to make the invite to WELCA personal, do not just invite the entire congregation with one announcement. Send a personalized card to someone at home or take time to call and invite them. Most ladies want to feel a connection not only with the church but in the church. Let them know that you are there and you are listening.

Bad Girls from the Bible with Pastor Jane Mitcham

Pastor Jane Mitcham's workshop on Bad Girls of the Bible was well attended in each session. Pastor Mitcham led the participants in a discussion about Eve as the first "bad " girl and her disobedience to God's instructions in the Garden of Eden. We discussed Mary Magdalene and why she was assumed to be a "bad" girl without any true biblical reference to that fact. The third "bad" girl discussed was the woman who anointed Jesus with expensive oil and we considered whether or not she was thought to be bad because she was a woman of independent means. Participants came away with interesting thoughts on the role of women in the Bible and why some strong women were considered to be "bad."

Craft/Service Project Workshop with Ella Shumpert

Ella Shumpert led the craft/service project workshop for the convention. She showed the group how to make bracelets using a button as an anchor and stringing beads in various patterns. Bishop Job and Mama Ala Mbwilo joined in to make the bracelets. There were 110 colorful bracelets made in the workshops to be sent to the children in Tanzania. Participants also made candle holders for the women to take home with them to remind them of the convention theme. Everyone enjoyed the fellowship as they helped each other make bracelets and candle holders.

Lutheran Catholic Dialogue with Pastor Mary Finklea

In her workshop, Pastor Mary Finklea facilitated a robust discussion regarding the ongoing *Lutheran-Catholic Dialogue* of the past fifty years using as a primary resource for our discussion the "Five Ecumenical Imperatives" as stated in Chapter VI of <u>From Conflict to Communion</u>, a report of the Lutheran-Roman Catholic Commission on Unity printed in 2013. Convention Highlights



Churchwide Representative

Anna Sarver, the WELCA Churchwide representative, brought greetings on behalf of the churchwide staff and the 2017-2020 WELCA Executive Board. She thanked SC WELCA for support through our regular and special offerings. She reported

the total revenue from all sources in 2017 was \$2,129,436. Using a powerpoint presentation, she used a pie chart to show the total operating expenditures in 2016. The largest expenditure went to Communications (49%). Women of the ELCA connects with participants in many ways. They use e-zines, e-newsletters, and paper magazines, newsletters to tell others how the organization (and that means all of us) is acting boldly on our faith in Jesus Christ. These include Daily Grace, Bold Café. Connections. Gather magazine. Interchange, a magazine for leaders. Anna mentioned that staff reductions in November 2017 created a slight reconfiguration in some staffing. She provided information about Faithful Friends, an opportunity to support WELCA by having a monthly recurring gift deducted from your checking account.

WELCA is the women's ministry organization of the ELCA. Anna reported there are three expressions of Women of the ELCA, each with its own constitution: the congregational units, the synodical women's organization, and the churchwide organization. We learned about an exciting new initiative approved by the churchwide board. Anna mentioned the All Anew Campaign for Katie's Fund. The goal is to grow the fund from its current total of \$1.5 million to \$4.5 million by July 2020. As an endowed fund, the annual income may be used by the churchwide women's organization for leadership development, living theology and global connections. We will be sharing information about this campaign as it becomes available.

Anna participated in our convention in numerous ways. In addition to bringing greetings, she led a Bible study on John 3:16-17 and assisted in the worship service as a lector. She attended all convention business meetings and participated in the pre-and post-convention board meetings. She recognized the outgoing board members and installed the new Board. She has a warm and pleasant personality, and we enjoyed having her at our convention.

2018 Keynote Speaker: The Reverend Mary M. Finklea
Wonderful! Fantastic! She is a light! Just a few expressions from the ladies who enjoyed our keynote speaker, Reverend Mary Finklea.



Pastor Mary and her husband, Wade, are from

Florence where she served as pastor of Cross and Crown Lutheran Church for twelve years. Enjoying some time away from congregational ministry, Pastor Mary serves as the campaign chair for the Love One Another SC Synod capital campaign for Lutheran Services Carolinas which was the topic of her presentation.

Pastor Mary explained to us that it took strength, commitment, discipline and patience to love one another, and that we have to depend on Christ to love our neighbor, enemy and stranger. Sometimes we struggle to love and Jesus knows we have to turn to him.

In keeping with our theme, "Christ, be our Light," Pastor Mary quoted Matthew 5:15: "Let your light shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven." She said, "Christ is our light and he dares to ask us to reflect and refract that same light into the world. Light shines and the proclamation of good news and new life is declared: Through foster kids finding support as they become young adults; through refugees finding a life where they are safe; through developmentally challenged adults finding a home where they can thrive."

Pastor Mary encouraged us to share the campaign by doing a six weeks program with our congregation.

We viewed a video introducing the campaign and three of the initiatives. She stressed that the campaign would really like to meet original one million dollar goal, and that she was convinced that we, as Women of the ELCA, will lead the way in caring for others and loving our neighbors as Christ has loved us.

Tanzania Report

We were honored and delighted to have Bishop Job Mbwilo, Bishop of the Companion synod, ELC of Tanzania, SW Diocese, and his wife Mama Ala Mbwilo as our guests at our convention this year. We were also pleased to have Dr. Cathy Milejczak, Companion Partnership Co-Coordinator, as our guest. Last year at convention Cathy reported that two of the girls' dormitories at the Itamba Secondary school were damaged or destroyed by arson. The SC WELCA board set a goal to raise \$10,000 to help replace the furnishings for these



dorms. Mama Ala brought greetings with the help of the Bishop who interpreted for her. She expressed her appreciation for all that the SC Synod and SC WELCA have done



with prayer, building the sleep house, buying fertilizer, buying sewing machines, shoes for the children, helping with the safe water project, mattresses and blankets, starting the kindergarten with 10 children, and now with the secondary school. These projects have made a difference in their lives and have helped them have hope for a better tomorrow.

Cathy gave a power point presentation with beautiful slides from her visit last year. She showed an example of a "safe water system" providing clean drinking water to the villagers, as well as pictures of ladies receiving bags of manure, gloves

and seeds. They are looking forward to the completion of the girls' dormitories and are so appreciative of the support they have received from SC Women of the ELCA. Cathy talked about the long history of partnership we have shared with the SW Diocese of the Lutheran Church in Tanzania. In 2002 the layette program was started, which continues still. She considers this to be the greatest social improvement that has been done because the babies are warm and do not get pneumonia, thereby increasing life expectancy beyond one year.

On Saturday morning, Shari Donley announced that we had surpassed our goal of \$10,000 and estimated that the silent auction would bring in over \$3,000. Bishop Job

Mbwilo and Mama Ala shared a song of thanks for these gifts. South Carolina Women of the ELCA answered God's call to support our sister Synod in Tanzania. With congregational support and through the grace of God, we were able to provide funds to replace the furnishings in the girl's dormitories. The funds will provide materials for building beds and furniture, and for purchasing linens and other necessary items. Give God the Glory!



Convention Entertainment




