
invisible, but we feel God's love and know God is always with us. That reminds us we can change daily for the better.



Thank you to all who have been able to continue to send offerings to the SC WELCA during these unusual times. As of August 31, 2020, we have received \$8,615 in Regular Offerings (65% is sent to Churchwide), \$1,667 in Joy Offerings for ELCA Good Gifts and \$2,471 for the convention projects – SC Network of Children's Advocacy Centers and Lutheran Disaster Response.

Although offerings are significantly below amounts budgeted for this year, most of our expenses are also below budget.

Since our 2020 convention was canceled, in accordance with our Constitution, at the September 20, 2020 Board meeting, the Board adopted the budget for February 2021 – January 2022 fiscal year and the audit report for the February 2019 – January 2020 fiscal year. These reports are included in this issue of the *RIPPLE*.

This audit review is in accordance with the Women of the ELCA constitution, amended at the 10th Triennial Convention, July 11-13, 2017. The annual accounting compilation or review may be conducted by an independent outside accountant or a review may be conducted by a committee appointed by the SWO board at the end of each fiscal year. The SC Synodical Board of the Women of the ELCA has appointed the undersigned as the Audit Review Committee for the fiscal year ending January 31, 2020.

This letter is to advise that we have reviewed the financial records for the South Carolina Women of the ELCA for the fiscal year 2019-2020. All of the financial policies set forth in the Standing Rules of the South Carolina Women of the ELCA have been followed. Each expense was approved by a member of the Synodical Board and cosigned by the President.

Our review indicated that the books and records of the organization were maintained in a very professional detailed manner. Funds were invested in institutions to achieve maximum earnings and security. Bank Accounts were reconciled monthly and reviewed by the SWO President. Complete detailed financial statements were submitted to the Synodical Board at each meeting.

CONGREGATIONAL CORNER

WELCA members of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Greenwood work with a small group of dedicated volunteers to prepare and serve between 100-175 meals every week

at their Soup Kitchen on Sundays. During the pandemic, they prepare meals which they serve in to -go boxes to clients who go through an outside line.



At St. Paul's in Aiken officers have been calling circle members to check in and share their faith. They also published an article in their congregational newsletter encouraging women to connect with one another by pausing for a moment of prayer at the time they would usually meet. For those few minutes they could all feel connected through prayer. They also helped with making children's face masks for the SC WELCA project and have donated a total of 145 masks.



As previously communicated in June 2020, the projects for the SC Network of Children's Advocacy Centers (SCNCAC) and Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) will carry over to our next convention. We are delighted to report below our interim contributions that have been delivered in person to the SCNCAC and by mail to LDR.

The Executive Director of SCNCAC said:

"South Carolina Network of Children's Advocacy Centers is grateful for the outpouring of generosity and support the Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America have shown in supporting Children's Advocacy Centers in our state. Your gracious monetary donations and donations of gift cards and hand-sewn masks have been integral during these uncertain times. Thank you for helping us meet our continued mission of ensuring the wellbeing of children impacted by abuse and neglect."



The Reverend and Director, ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Appeal, Daniel Rift said in a letter to SC WELCA:

No matter the variety of disaster, no matter the variety of need, your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response enable people to rebuild their lives and livelihoods now and far into the future."

Any additional monetary or gift card contributions received will count toward the 2021 cycle of contributions for the projects. Monetary donations and gift cards should be sent to the SC WELCA treasurer. Post-August, the Action team will continue to reevaluate the Lutheran Disaster Response actions regarding the pandemic and other disasters and may amend or supplement the global project recommendation based on the evolving situation and prioritized needs, including but not limited to the needs of the SC Synod, our region, the church wide organization, and our neighbors around the globe.

Many thanks to the ladies of SC WELCA across the state who so lovingly responded to the Call for Action regarding our face mask project for the SC Network of Children's Advocacy Centers (SCNCAC). As of August 26, we had delivered 509 masks, and our gifts were timely indeed as the centers were slowly reopening to provide in-person services. By mid-October, we have received another 285 masks for an updated total of 794 masks so far! We encourage those who wish to do so to continue in this loving act of service as the need appears to be ongoing for the foreseeable future.

The centers prefer adult size and child size masks for 4-12 year-olds, The centers do not need masks for children under the age of 4 due to the risk of suffocation. SC WELCA LADIES SHARE THEIR EXPERIENCES

DURING THE PANDEMIC

What this Pandemic and Quarantine Has Been Like for Me

I have definitely had my ups and downs this year. In some respects, I wish I could just erase 2020 from my mind but then I stop and think of the good I have experienced during this time of uncertainty in our lives.

In February my beautiful, smart, and loving niece passed away from a brain tumor. Leigh was diagnosed in early January. Even though her battle was short it was not without severe pain, surgeries and seizures. For our family, especially her parents and older sister, this has been the most difficult thing that we have ever had to endure. We continue to grieve and keeping asking God why Leigh? She was only 31 years old, the same age as our own daughter. Leigh was a brilliant high school science teacher and she gave her all for her students and those that she loved. Her students also loved her very much in return. Being in quarantine for us has meant that we have had to face the grief of losing a loved one and not really being able to be there for Leigh's parents and her amazing sister. But it has given us time to reflect on our loss by reading books on grief that have helped us realize that maybe God took Leigh quickly before all of this pandemic illness hit the world. Leigh's mother and I discussed that if Leigh had been alive during all of this craziness, she would possibly have been alone in the hospital while getting her treatments and suffering alone. Just the thought of her in a hospital and no one able to be with her was a horrible thought. That makes us think that it was God's way of saving Leigh and her family from the torture of being separated from her during those hard times.

As time has gotten a little better, we now know what measures are necessary to protect ourselves and those we love from Covid-19. Our home has been a safe haven for my sister-in-law, brother-in-law and our niece. We have enjoyed weekends together, good food and wine. We have had a chance to lean on one another and have great conversations. For that we are so grateful. We have seen firsthand people reaching out and caring for all of us. We have felt the prayers being lifted up to us and we see Leigh in the beauty of the sky, trees, mountains which give us some comfort that she is resting in her heavenly Father's arms.

I have had time to make memory quilts from Leigh's favorite t-shirts for a few loved ones. I have started sessions with a spiritual director. I have started my own personal Bible Study and spending time with God. I'm trying to rebuild a relationship with him and getting over my anger with him for taking Leigh at such an early age. She had a lifetime to live and I am facing my grief but at the same time trying to get over the guilt I have that it wasn't me instead of her. Why did God spare me and not her? After all I am a cancer survivor.

I have been participating in a few Zoom Bible Studies with friends from our old church in Virginia. Friday mornings they host Coffee and Conversation. It's a simple devotion and discussion on the morning topic.

I grew a vegetable garden in pots and now have planted a few veggies for the fall and winter in raised beds. Never before have I grown a vegetable, but I am enjoying learning everything I can to give them a good chance at life.

I took a chalk painting class, and I am enjoying turning thrift store buys around giving them new life. As words in the **Peace Prayer of Saint Francis**

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:
Where there is hatred, let me sow love; Where there is injury, pardon
Where there is doubt, faith Where there is despair, hope

Where there is darkness, light Where there is sadness, joy.

O divine Master grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen. - Risse Snelgrove




Dear S.C. WELCA members!

I have been struggling to find my sense of community. As a nurse I have seen my patients alone when no one should be; I have talked to a countless number of their friends and family on the phone to provide them as much comfort as I can because their community couldn't be there. I have had dear friends fall ill and consoled those whose friends weren't as lucky, reminding me of why I've been turning from community. Then we sent out a call for you to show us community in action during Covid. I had my doubts. I didn't think it was possible to do that now. I should have known better... Greenville's St. Michael's was able to hold their circle meetings covering the book "The Parables" by gathering outside with masks and practicing social distancing.

In Walhalla, St. John's is distributing meals to seniors and homebound congregational members, they raised \$5,500 for St. Luke Methodist Food Bank with their Holy Smoke BBQ, they came together virtually to help with music during worship and they made and donated masks. All during Covid. It doesn't stop there though...

Faith Lutheran Chapel found a safe way to continue having small group by disinfecting, masking and spreading out. They even had a "Ladies Night Out" at a member's home where they were able to share stories on how to cope through Covid, catch up church as well as local news, and even have some fun with "Bible Bingo." And they donated. Oh boy did they donate. They donated to Pickens County Detention Center, to the Greenville Area Parkinson Society, to Lutheran World Relief, to Mary's House, to Pickens County Humane Society with prayer books and raising money and quilts and supplies and masks.

Covid didn't stop any of them from safely reaching out to their... community.

Not long ago I saw a proud new father holding his baby in the hospital window to show a cheering crowd down below who couldn't go inside. Now, instead of seeing a family alone, I saw the community standing right outside.

The wonderful, ever adapting women of WELCA have given me my sense of community back.

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you.

For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. Isaiah 43: 1 – 3a

I am sure I heard and read these words of the prophet, Isaiah, many times over the years. But you know how you can hear something and then at another time, you can *really hear it* as if for the first time. Well the time I *really heard* these words were in my first year of ministry as an ordained pastor. I attended our InterFaith meeting which I always enjoyed. The meeting began in the usual way with a devotional. That evening a fellow female pastor read these stirring words from Isaiah. And I heard them, *really heard them*.

I knew this pastor had recently gone through three months of tough life tragedies ranging from health issues to spousal health issues and loss of employment. This woman shared how there were so many times when they didn't know as a family if they were going to lose their home or be able to pay their bills and buy groceries. They didn't know if they would recover their health again. And they had children to support.

This brave pastor shared that many days she felt like giving up – that life was just too much. And then she said, "I opened my *Bible* and found my way to this Isaiah passage. And as I read these words, I heard them, *really heard them* in a way I never before had."

She continued, "The words jumped out at me as if God was there at that dining room table saying them aloud were '**Do not fear**, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, **you are mine.**" She shared the promises of a loving Father assuring her became her life jacket as she swam through the deep waters with a strong undertow of fear, anxiety, restless, sleepless nights. Often, she would wake gasping for breath. The phrase, '**Do not fear** because **you are mine'** became her mantra.

I sat there that night spellbound by her story and the depth of emotion and TRUST she exhibited as she said, 'Do not fear because you are mine.'

I have thought of that evening so many times since mid-March when Covid hit us – shutting down everything and most of life as we know it.

I have thought about that evening and the pastor's passionate reading of Isaiah reminding us not to be afraid because we **are** God's children. And we know that God is a God of healing; we know that God brings new life even in the face of apparent death and dying. We know that God is with us even when the waters threaten to overwhelm us.

I think we have all had days since Covid started when we sort of *hit a brick wall* either from fear of it or from fatiguing of it. So many have lost their lives or lost their livelihoods to it. It has invaded our lives leaving us shaken and wondering when it will end.

The people to which Isaiah is writing too felt the same way. They had been in exiled captivity so long they had given up believing they would ever return to their homeland. And it is into this context that God inspires Isaiah to write these beautiful words of hope: 'Do not fear because you are mine.' My prayer is that just as this became the mantra for my pastor friend and for the Israelites, this will become your mantra too during this time of Covid. And on your most down days as you repeat this mantra, may you hear it, *really hear it* and may it give you comfort and peace as you feel God's love filling you, easing away every one of your fears. Amen! Let it Be!!

If you are seeking a means to use your gifts, have fun, and build closer relationships with your fellow SC WELCA sisters, you might prefer to run for the state board. We need at least 8 candidates to fill 4 positions. The President will be elected by Ecclesiastical ballot.

Look around your congregation and conferences and encourage ladies that you think would be willing to submit their names for nomination. We need your help! This has been a "strange, not normal" year with the pandemic, but with God's help, we will make it through. Because we have not had much contact with each other, we need to pray for each other and for the SC WELCA. We were not able to have the 2020 Convention, churches have been closed (and some still are), no conference meetings, and no circle meetings in our congregations. All this is more reason for each of us to pray, consider, and encourage "bold" women to place their name on the nomination ballot.

Election Process

The SC WELCA Board made the difficult decision to cancel our 2020 annual convention because of the risks involved with COVID-19. This decision meant that we were not able to elect a President, a Treasurer, and four board members. The Churchwide Executive Board recommended that the ladies holding these positions remain in their positions until the next election in 2021. In 2021, the positions of Vice President, secretary, and four board members would normally be elected as well.

At the September 20, 2020 Board meeting, the Board voted to approve a plan they felt best suited our synodical organization. Under this plan, in 2021 we will have elections for those positions whose terms were up in 2020; that is, the President, the Treasurer, and four board members. They will be elected for two year terms (2021-2023). The positions which would normally have been elected in 2021 will be asked to remain in place for an additional year and elections for these positions will be held in 2022; that is, the Vice President, the secretary, and four board members.

Approving this plan will prevent having elections for every position on the Board in 2021.

Simply put, at the 2021 convention, we will be electing a President, a Treasurer, and four Board members.


